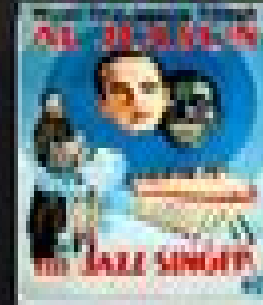
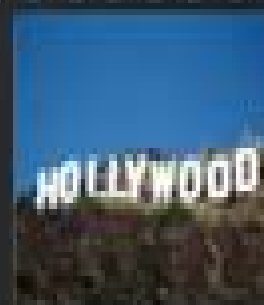
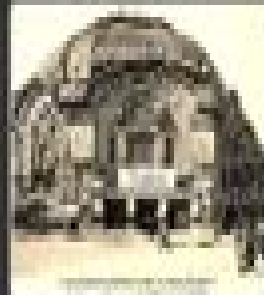


HISTORY OF THE CINEMA
