Samosata Before the revolutions of late antiquity which saw the scriptural religions of Christianity and Islam enforced by imperial might there were few constraints on belief Everything changed however in the millennium between the appearance of the Homeric poems and Christianity's establishment as Rome's state religion in the fourth century AD As successive Greco Roman empires grew in size and complexity and power was increasingly concentrated in central capitals states sought to impose collective religious adherence first to cults devoted to individual rulers and ultimately to monotheism In this new world there was no room for outright disbelief the label atheist was used now to demonize anyone who merely disagreed with the orthodoxy and so it would remain for centuries As the twenty first century shapes up into a time of mass information but also paradoxically of collective amnesia concerning the tangled histories of religions Whitmarsh provides a bracing antidote to our assumptions about the roots of freethinking By shining a light on atheism's first thousand years Battling the Gods offers a timely reminder that nonbelief has a wealth of tradition of its own and indeed its own heroes **Iudith** Lawrence M.
